How have we responded to His outreach to us in His Son and how might we respond to his love and sacrifice for us as we live as his lights in the world?

Parish Finances

The 2025 budget that was approved at the PCC meeting on 27th December 2024 showed the following figures:

Our reserves as of 31^{st} December were £ 81,673. The safety level is £ 60,000, which amounts to just over 14 weeks of expenditure.

The largest item of expenditure is our Parish Share, which is set by Salisbury Diocese for 2025 at £133,940. Most of this sum pays the costs of our two full-time clergy (Team Rector and Team Vicar) including their stipends (salaries) and housing costs. Although we do not currently have a Rector, we do not get a reduction in our Parish Share as the Diocesan budget allows for a percentage of vacancies at any one time. Other costs are stipends and training of curates and central Diocesan staff. In case you wonder, the Diocesan budget does not include the costs of Salisbury Cathedral. The Diocese had a deficit of around £1.2 million in 2023, so they need us to pay our full Parish Share.

In order to avoid a shortage in our cash reserves, the main way we can cut our expenditure is to reduce our payments of the Parish Share. The Diocesan have accepted a temporary reduction of £41,040, reducing our predicted deficit to £20,000 and leaving our cash

reserves at about £61,000. If we manage to reduce our deficit further we can release more money to the Diocese. If we carry on paying less to the Diocese over several years, there may be consequences in terms of future resourcing of ministry in our Parish.

The PCC are looking at other areas to reduce expenditure including payments for utilities (mainly heating), church and parish hall running costs and staffing of the Parish office.

The budgeted income for 2025 includes £27,800 for hire of the church and parish hall, PCC fees, sales, investment income and refreshments. The amount of income to be raised directly from church members, donations, legacies, gift days etc. is £193,364.

On average around 177 adults regularly attend our churches. To balance our budget, we need an average monthly income of **£91** from each adult. Obviously, some people cannot afford this amount, but others could pay more. Please consider whether you could increase your giving and if possible, sign up to the Parish Giving Scheme. Details are available at the back of the church or from the Parish Office.

2pm at Sandford St Martin's Church. 'Setting Sail' - with time after for cup of tea, chat


and a raffle for charity. All are most welcome.


